It has been a difficult year.

We are thinking of the continuing war in Israel, and of the consequences of that war for our friends and relatives who live in Israel, of the plight of the hostages still held in captivity, of the continuing erosion of support for Israel in world opinion and of the ever-increasing number of acts of anti-Semitism in North America.

The main purpose of our shul is to serve as a place to pray. There has never been a more appropriate time to do that than now. Please join us for the upcoming High Holidays and, even if it is not part of your usual routine, consider attending a Sabbath service. By way of example, we say a prayer every Sabbath for the safe return of the hostages - a small way of showing solidarity.

We are very fortunate that the excellent *chazzonim* (cantors) who led our prayer services during last year's High Holidays have agreed to return this year. They are very much worth listening to. They make our service more uplifting. The schedule for services is attached.

We hope to launch a new fundraising drive to complete the cycle of repairs that began with the repair of the roof. Still in need of repair is the western (Bellevue) side of the building which we must address in order to prevent further deterioration. You may expect to hear more from us about this in the coming months.

Just so that no one is taken by surprise, the parking lot just north of the shul on Bellevue is no more. The City decided that the lot should be used instead for community housing. This creates a problem for us because alternate parking in the vicinity is difficult to find. But the shul endures because its members want it to endure. Please renew your memberships on a timely basis and remit the appropriate amounts accordingly.



On behalf of the Board, we wish you and yours a very happy and healthy 5786. We wish for peace in Israel and a safe return of the hostages. And we look forward to seeing you in shul.
